Pre-School



New School Menu

Further to our recent letter, here is another look at our spring term menu!



Our revamped menu is inspired by the fantastic feedback from our pupil council focus group and the 'School Meal Experience Survey' conducted at the start of the term. The children have spoken, and they requested a more relaxed, family-style dining experience, where they can enjoy their meals with friends, at their own pace. They also mentioned feeling overwhelmed by the plethora of daily options.

From Tuesday, 7th January, our new in-house lunch service will offer just that! pupils of all ages can dine whenever they choose within the lunch hour, sitting at mixed-age group tables and sharing the meal of the day from communal serving platters. This includes a delightful variety of hot and cold side dishes, with fresh fruit and yoghurt served daily.

The ordering process remains the same. We will upload the Spring menu at the end of term, so you can start placing orders over the Christmas holidays. Meals are priced at £2.53 each, which includes a choice of main meal and dessert. If your child is in Years R, 1 or 2, or you are eligible for pupil premium funding, your meals are free. Orders can be placed as usual via Parent Pay.
